

PARTNERSHIPS: COUNTY & CITIES

County & Six Incorporated Cities

- Historical Joint Meeting on Homelessness

City of Sacramento - Result of the 2022 Partnership Agreement - 100% Complete

- 10 Behavioral Health Workers
- 15 CalAIM Case Staff
- 25 Encampment Outreach Workers
- 11th CORE Behavioral Health Center within the city center – 16th and X Street
- The County to open 200 new shelter beds within 12 months and an additional 200 beds within 36 months – Florin, East Parkway and Watt Safe Stay sites
- The County will operate 200 additional shelter beds in the City jurisdiction - Stockton Safe Stay site

City of Citrus Heights

- County-funded Community Health Navigator

City of Rancho Cordova

- County transfers two acres of land to the City to use for the next phase of Mather Veteran’s Village
